# CELEBRATING JUNETEENTH Parent And Family Edition

Juneteenth is a holiday that celebrates freedom and the end of slavery in the United States. It honors the day over 250,000 enslaved people in Texas learned they were free. Juneteenth, short for "June nineteenth," has been observed by African American communities for over 150 years and continues to be celebrated in cities and towns across the country every year on June 19. Juneteenth is also known as Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, and Emancipation Day.

#### History

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, the day General Gordon Granger led Union soldiers into Galveston, Texas and spread word that enslaved African Americans in Texas were free. This was two and a half years after President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, an order granting freedom to enslaved African Americans in all Confederate states. Because of the American Civil War, the Emancipation Proclamation couldn't be enforced in places under Confederate control. When the Civil War ended in April 1865, Union soldiers were finally able to reach Texas with the news. Later that year, the 13th Amendment to the Constitution officially ended slavery in all U.S. states.

## **Today's Celebrations**

While many newly freed African Americans stayed in Texas, tens of thousands left in search of new opportunities and brought their families, holidays, and traditions with them across the U.S. Juneteenth celebrations spread and it became a day each year to celebrate and rejoice in their freedom.

African American communities have celebrated Juneteenth since its first anniversary in 1866. Over 110 years later, in 1980, Texas officially named Juneteenth a state holiday. In 2021, Juneteenth was recognized by the U.S. government as a federal holiday. Communities across the U.S. celebrate Juneteenth with parades, marches, barbecues, picnics, performances, and other special events.

Juneteenth is more than a holiday. It is a time to reflect on the strength and resilience of the Black community and celebrate Black pride, culture, and experience. This dedicated time to reflect and celebrate remains especially important today as Black people continue to experience unfair treatment, violence, and racism.

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## **Reflect and Celebrate!**

- For Black families, Juneteenth can be a time to talk about your community's fight for justice. Your family may have their very own everyday heroes, like Blake and Olivia in *Little Lens!* Listen to them share about the <u>bravery and strength of their family members</u>, then share stories of your own.

- Juneteenth's history and meaning can be the start to broader conversations about slavery, race, and racism. Parents and caregivers, consider using the <u>National Museum of African</u> <u>American History and Culture: Kids Understanding and Celebrating Juneteenth</u> to help you navigate more in-depth conversations about slavery and freedom with young children.
